Theatre Royal, Windsor
Wednesday 4th February



On the evening of 4th February 13 of our members went to see Barnum at the Theatre Royal Windsor.

It is based on the life of the showman B.T. Barnum covering the period 1835 - 1880 wherever he took his performing companies.

B.T. Barnum was played by Lee Mead who actually walked the tightrope during the performance.

The show featured an ensemble of 20 actor-musicians playing 150 different instruments and was choreographed by Oti Mabusi.

The show was colourful and full of action with singing dancing and some very risqué acrobatics one of the best musicals we have seen and well recommended.

Brooklands Motoring and Aviation Museum Tuesday 3rd March

On a beautiful sunny day in March 5 of our group met at Brooklands Motoring and Aviation Museum. When we got there we went straight to the café for coffee and some had a bite to eat.

After that we wandered around the various parts of the museum that contained not only planes and cars but buses, motor cycle and cycles.

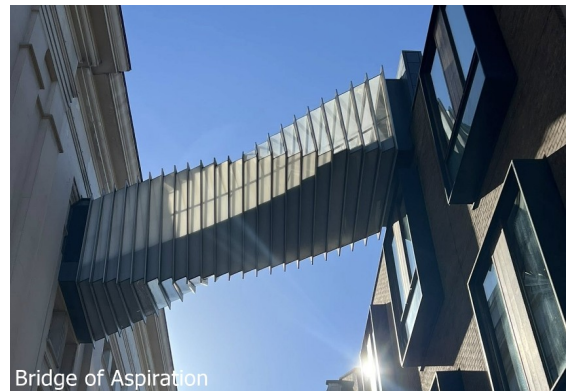
Our designated tour leader was not available so the guy who manages the tours took us round, he was excellent and very knowledgeable.

The tour started with a bit of history of the building and the Royal Ballet and Opera or RBO, as they are known. Next

we went up to the highest level, entered the auditorium and sat and listened to a bit of rehearsal of Rigoletto, a bit of one of the raunchy scenes. The sound of the unamplified voices was amazing even where we were sitting. This was due to the careful design of the building.

The next part of the tour took us to the bridge that joins the Opera House to the Royal Ballet School just across the road, the bridge is named “The Bridge of Aspiration”.

The bridge was quite an engineering feat; not only did it have to join the two buildings which were at different levels, it also had to obscure the view from the street looking up, obscure the view from the bridge to the neighbouring apartments and look good. You will see from the pictures that all these challenges were successfully overcome.



We went on across the bridge and through to the ballet school to see a ballerina practising.

Finally we visited the workshop where all the props were made. They were currently making quite a complex model of a donkey; until fairly recently a live donkey was used in the ballet “A Midsummer Night’s Dream” but all future performances will use this model (similar to the War Horse models).

What a very informative tour, highly recommended.

Bank of England and Museum of London Docklands Tuesday 24th April



On Tuesday 24th April 15 of our members went up to Waterloo by train and then took the Waterloo and City line to Bank, a short walk from the Bank of England Museum.

After passing security we split up and wandered through the museum; at some points a staff member gave a short talk on a particular part of the bank’s history.

The guided tour was excellent with a very knowledgeable guide.

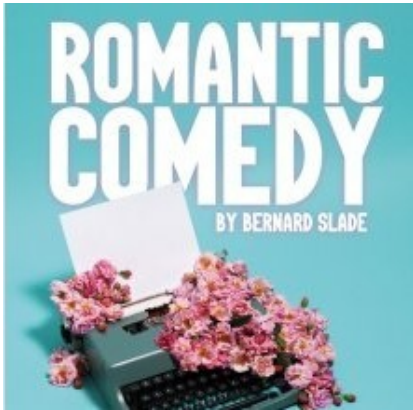
Because we had spent an hour or so looking around before the tour we had had enough by the end so sat and had a cup of coffee before returning to Waterloo via the Thames clipper.

Wokingham Historic Walk Friday 14th August



On a bright, sunny August morning at 09:30 twelve of us started out from the Cantley Park car park to do a Blue Plaque and Mosaic walk of Wokingham town centre.

The walk was arranged and lead by Barbara, one of our members, and it took us up to and around the town looking at some of the more interesting buildings.



The old market town of Wokingham (originally called Oakingham) has a wealth of old and interesting buildings from 14th century cottages, 16th century Tudor school house to 20th century Electric Theatre which is now occupied by the Nationwide Building Society.



We also saw several of the 10 mosaics that are scattered around the town.
